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Dear friends - what strange times we live in.

The last time that we traveled anywhere was in March of last year to exhibit at the 2020 New York Book Fair

We were planning to exhibit at the September New York Book Fair – but that has been canceled due to Covid-19.

Strangely enough it has been a busy year for buying and selling. Caroline, Debra, Dustin and yours truly have been busy cataloging many new and interesting items.

This catalog is the first of a series that we shall be publishing over the coming months.

It is devoted to Cosway and Cosway-Style bindings together with a selection of Fore-Edge paintings by Miss C.B. Currie and Helen Haywood.

Many people ask 'what is the difference between a Cosway binding and a Cosway-Style binding?'

Cosway bindings were invented in 1903 by John Stonehouse of the London bookselling firm Henry Sotheran and are usually elaborately bound by Rivière & Son and have, set into the front cover (sometimes the rear cover or the inside paste-downs) one or more miniatures hand-painted on ivory by Miss C.B. Currie.

Cosway-Style bindings are very similar - but the hand-painted miniatures are by other various artists. These can also be bound by Rivière and Son, and then from 1927 onward Bayntun-Rivière, Bayntun of Bath and Sangorski & Sutcliffe. Richard Smart of Vancouver BC is now producing some fine examples (see Winston Churchill's *The Story of the Malakand Field Force*).

This catalog contains thirty-seven examples including five 'Cosway' bindings, twenty-four 'Cosway-Style' bindings and eight 'Fore-Edge' bindings with the edge hand painted by Miss C.B. Currie or Miss Helen Haywood. The titles offered here include first editions of William Makepeace Thackeray's *Vanity Fair* (1848), Robert Burns' *Poems Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect* (1787), Charles Dickens' *Sketches by Boz* (1839) and *Pickwick Papers* (1837), Joseph Conrad's *An Outcast of the Islands* (1896), and Winston Churchill's *The History of the Malakand Field Force* (1898).

Here offered are three examples of Izaac Walton's *Compleat Angler* and a superb two volume edition of Samuel Johnsons' *Lives of the Poets* with two very fine fore-edge paintings by Helen Haywood.

There is also a very rare Cedric Chivers Cosway-Style binding. We have handled many Chivers bindings over the past fifty-five years but we have never seen another Cosway-Style binding by Cedric Chivers.

The Poets are also well represented with excellent examples from Robert Burns, Oliver Goldsmith, John Keats and Percy Bysshe Shelley.

We sincerely hope that you will enjoy looking through the following pages and that you will find something of special interest.



A Spectacular Cosway Binding with Two Oval and Eight Circular Miniatures By Miss C.B. Currie

Twenty-one engraved plates and a photogravure frontispiece. Handsomely bound ca. 1904 in a full dark green levant morocco Cosway Binding by Rivière & Sons for Sotheran & Co., stamp-signed to front turn in. Spine with five raised bands decoratively tooled and lettered in gilt. The front and back covers are ruled and decoratively tooled in a gilt, surrounding ten oval/round miniature paintings under glass. Nine miniatures on the front cover depict eight hunting dogs around a stag; the miniature on the back cover is a portrait of Sir Edwin Landseer. Board edges double ruled in gilt, with turn-ins ruled and decoratively tooled in gilt. Green marbled endpapers. Joints expertly and totally invisibly repaired. A fine copy. Housed in the original burgundy roan slipcase. An outstanding, quite beautiful example.

This binding is almost identical to one that was sold at the HRH The Prince Henry, Duke of Gloucester sale Christie's London January 26th, 2006, lot #754 (£13,200/\$23,630). That example was referred to in Stephen Ratcliffe's Hidden Treasures. Although unsigned, the ten 'miniatures' are the artwork of Miss C.B. Currie, whose name was never mentioned on any Cosway Bindings prior to 1911. These ten 'miniatures' are amongst the finest examples that we have seen.



Front and rear joints expertly repaired. With the engraved bookplate of Shipton Court, Oxon., the home of Edward and Emily Spencer on front blank. A wonderful example of a true 'Cosway Binding'.

The fine portrait miniature which is undoubtedly by Miss C. B. Currie has been taken from the photogravure plate facing page 26.

Stephen Ratcliffe mentions five examples of the same title in his *Cosway Bindings. A Complete Illustrated Catalogue...* One of them has a center portrait miniature of Georgiana, Duchess of Devonshire... two of them have portrait miniatures of Lady Priscilla Bertie, one with a portrait miniature of Lady Northwick, and the fifth with a portrait miniature of Mrs. Cosway and her baby daughter Angelica. All of the miniatures are by Miss C.B. Currie.



Currie" and on the rear doublure "Bound by Rivière & Son from designs by J.H. Stonehouse." Original red cloth covers and spine bound in at end. An attractive example of a Cosway binding. Housed in it's original felt-lined, brown cloth slipcase.

In the first decade of the twentieth century, the London bookselling firm of Henry Sotheran & Co., introduced a type of binding that was decorative, had historic associations, and catered to the level of quality expected by connoisseurs at the time. Between 1902 and 1903, John Harrison Stonehouse (1864–1937), managing director of Sotheran's, created what came to be referred to as "Cosway bindings."

Each cover (front and back) with a superb large rectangular hand painted miniature on ivory by Miss C.B. Currie, set beneath glass. Each spine embossed with the author and title. The Complete Angler with burnt-orange silk moire endpapers, signed in gilt by "Rivière & Son" on front free endpaper, and on the rear free endpaper "Miniatures by Miss Currie", all edges gilt. Each volume housed in a felt-lined green cloth chemise within a specially fitted half dark green morocco over green cloth boards, spines with three raised bands, ruled and lettered in gilt in compartments. Exceptionally fine.

In over fifty-five years of dealing in antiquarian books I have only ever seen one other example of a Cosway Gold Binding - this was a very similar binding both in size and appearance, also with two large miniatures by Miss Currie on a copy of John Milton's Paradise Lost - sold by me at E. Joseph to a private London collector in January 1985 for £4,800 (\$5,375) DJB.




A Superb Early Twentieth Century 'Cosway' Binding by Rivière & Son

Double-ruled gilt board edges, elaborate gilt turn ins decorated with fish, fish baskets and floral pointillé. Green watered silk liners and endleaves, top edge gilt, others uncut. Spine lightly sunned. Housed in its original green morocco edged, chamois lined, faux alligator over board slipcase, a little rubbed at extremities. A truly spectacular and early example of a Cosway Binding.

Although unsigned, both 'miniatures' are almost certainly the artwork of Miss C.B. Currie, whose name was never mentioned on any Cosway-Bindings prior to 1911. After the Bible and Shakespeare, The Complete Angler remains one of the most reprinted books in the English language. Coigney, 21d.

At the top left-hand corner is a very fine hand-painted portrait miniature of Marie Antoinette, set under glass within a gilt metal frame surrounded by gilt dots and four sets of three red semi-precious stones (one stone missing). The rear cover with a similar floral design and the arms of Marie Antoinette in gilt. Smooth spine withsimilar gilt floral design, black morocco label lettered in gilt. Decorative gilt board edges and turn-ins, cream watered silk liners and endleaves, all edges rough gilt. Housed in the original velvet-lined blue buckram clamshell case, spine with black morocco label lettered in gilt. Fine. The quality of the miniature is quite superb and could most possibly have been painted by Miss C.B. Currie.

We have owned this book once before in 1990. We have handled many Chivers bindings over the past fifty-five years but we have never seen another Cosway-Style binding by Cedric Chivers.

The miniature is surrounded by a rectangular recessed frame with eight onlaid red morocco flowers and twenty-four onlaid beige morocco leaves. The front joint of volume II has been expertly and almost invisibly repaired. The second volume with with a central green morocco medallion with the phrase "Pansies/Let My Flowers Be" stamped in gilt. Spines with five raised bands elaborately decorated and lettered in gilt in compartments, four of which have onlaid green morocco flowers. Double gilt-ruled board edges and elaborate gilt turn-ins, dark blue watered silk liners and endleaves, all edges gilt and gauffered. Housed in a custom-made quarter morocco fleece-lined (with a divider) clamshell case, two spines lettered in gilt in compartments.

A wonderful early Sangorski & Sutcliffe Cosway-style binding. The miniature is of exceptional quality and is quite possibly the work of Miss C.B. Currie.

Minimal rubbing to joints, plates generally a little toned, still a near fine and very desirable copy of this classic. Harry F. Marks, was a renowned early twentieth century New York City bookman and the Black Sun Press' distributor in America. Marks had many books specially bound for his clientele by Sangorski & Sutcliffe.




Margaret of Valois (1553-1615) was a French Princess of the Valois dynasty who became Queen Consort of Navarre and later also of France. By her marriage to Henry III of Navarre (later Henry IV of France), she was Queen of Navarre and then France at her husband's 1589 accession to the latter throne. Their marriage was annulled in 1599 by decision of the Pope. She was the daughter of King Henry II of France and Catherine de' Medici and the sister of Kings Francis II, Charles IX and Henry III. Her marriage, which was to celebrate the reconciliation of Catholics and Huguenots, was tarnished by the St. Bartholomew's Day massacre, and the resumption of the religious troubles which ensued.







The rear inside cover in full brown crushed levant morocco, purple silk endleaves, all edges gilt. A stunning, fine and exceptionally beautiful Jewelled Cosway-Style Binding by Sangorski & Sutcliffe at their very best. Housed in the original cream watered silk lined dark red morocco clamshell case. Case expertly repaired and a little rubbed. A spectacular, near fine crisp and wide-margined Cosway-Style binding.



A fine example housed in the original faux lizard, leather edged slipcase.

The Vicar of Wakefield was written 1761-1762, and published in 1766. It was one of the most popular and widely read 18th-century novels during the Victorian era, referred to in George Eliot's Middlemarch, Jane Austen's Emma, Charles Dickens' A Tale of Two Cities and David Copperfield, Mary Shelley's Frankenstein, Sarah Grand's The Heavenly Twins, Charlotte Brontë's The Professor and Villette, Louisa May Alcott's Little Women and in Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's The Sorrows of Young Werther.

Haywood became acquainted with the art form of fore-edge painting through an uncle who was associated with the Bayntun-Riviere Bindery of Bath. She did several fore-edge and double fore-edge paintings on commission every year from the 1930s to the 1970s for Inman's Books, an antiquarian book dealer in New York City.






Adelaide Hanscom Leeson (1875-1931) was an early 20th-century artist and photographer who published some of the first books using photography to illustrate literary works. She set up a photographic studio in San Francisco in 1902 with Blanche Cumming. In late 1903 they began working on a series of photographs to illustrate the classic selection of poems, The *Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam*. The concept of illustrating a literary work with fine art photographs was new at that time, and *The Rubaiyat* was one of the first American books in this genre.
