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

First edition, One of Fifty Large-Paper Copies. Large quarto (16 1/8 x 12 5/8 inches; 410 x 321 mm.). With forty-eight hand-colored plates. Text watermarked J. Whatman 1811 and 1816, plates watermarked J. Whatman 1811. Mid to late twentieth century three-quarter red morocco over cockerel boards ruled in gilt. Spine with five raised bands, decoratively tooled and lettered in gilt, cockerel end-papers, all edges rough gilt. Housed in a red cloth slipcase. A spectacular and exceptionally rare Large-Paper Copy - only the third that we have seen in over fifty years. The last Large Paper Copy to appear at auction was the Spitz copy at Christie's, London in 2015.

"Originally issued in 12 monthly parts, with 4 plates to each part, the first appearing 1 Jan. 1816... On completion it was issued in quarto boards at 7 guineas or in the parts complete for £7. 4s. Fifty copies were printed on large paper at 1 guinea per part and on completion issued in atlas quarto for 12 guineas. Twenty-five copies were printed with the plates uncoloured India proof impressions." (Tooley, pp. 8/9). Abbey, Scenery 438; Tooley 3; Prideaux, pp. 126 and 332.

Hand colored lithographed pictorial title-page and thirty-two plates hand-colored lithograph plates heightened with gum arabic, on sixteen sheets. Several of the plates have more than one image depicted. Some minimal marginal soiling and toning. An excellent copy of this extremely scarce title. Publisher's brown cloth over boards, covers decorated in blind, front cover lettered in gilt, pale brown endpapers.

Very scarce: According to OCLC there are just five copies located in libraries and institutions worldwide.

Albert ADAM (1833-1900) was the son of Caricaturist and lithographer Jean Victor Adam (1801-1867) whom he often assisted with his commissions.

Thirty-six superb hand colored aquatint plates by J.Harris after H. Alken, W.J. Shayer, and W.A. Knell. Contemporary full red morocco, covers decoratively bordered in gilt. Spine with gilt in compartments, gilt-ruled board edges, decorative gilt turn-ins, plum coated liners and endleaves with the original rectangular burgundy morocco label lettered in gilt "Ackermann's / Sporting / Scraps / [rule] / 36 plates / 1850. 1851." on front pastedown, all edges gilt. Armorial bookplate of Henry Duke of Gloucester on front endpaper and another on verso.

Excessively Rare. According to OCLC there is just one copy in libraries and institutions worldwide.

One of the Scarcest of All 19th Century Color-Plate Books "The Rarest Alken Item" (Abbey)

ALKEN, Henry. Military Duties, Occurances &c. &c... [London]: Thomas McLean 26 Haymarket, [n.d., c. 1820]. First edition (variant). Quarto (10 5/16 x 7 inches; 263 x 178 mm). Fifty-six superbly hand-colored etched plates inlaid within a window cut from a leaf of gray paper with an elaborately engraved border surrounding the print. Title and captions in manuscript. The plates are as clean and fresh as one could hope for. Contemporary full red straight-grain morocco, elaborately gilt, original blue-gray endpapers, all edges gilt. With the bookplates of New York financier Alfred Barmore Maclay (1871-1944); Jane Sarah Casel; and Henry, Duke of Gloucester (1900-1974) on front paste-down. A remarkable example of one of the scarcest of all 19th century color-plate books. OCLC/KVK note only one copy in institutional holdings, apparently the only complete copy to be recorded, presumably the same copy noted by Abbey as being sold in 1907.

Exceptionally Rare Series of Alken Sporting Plates

ALKEN, Henry. *Moments of Fancy...* We rather fancy than Know. London: Published by Thomas M'Lean, 1822-23. First edition. Oblong folio (10 3/4 x 15 5/8 inches; 273 x 396 mm.). Fourteen fine hand colored engraved plates. Two tiny neatly repaired marginal tears, some very light soiling to blank margins, otherwise near fine. Rebound ca. 1960 by Fred Shihadeh in half brown morocco over marbled boards, decoratively ruled in blind, front cover with black morocco label lettered in gilt. Original red morocco label lettered in gilt on front paste-down. A complete and excellent copy of this extremely rare suite of plates. Thirteen of the plates are dated 1822 - plate no. 9 is dated 1823.

A Fine Contemporary Album Containing Eighteen of Henry Alken's Highly Amusing Hand Colored Lithographs

ALKEN, Henry, illustrator. [Sporting Notions]. [London: T. McLean, 1831-33]. Small oblong quarto (6 11 /16 x 8 3/8 inches; 170 x 212 mm.). Eighteen fine hand colored lithographs mounted on G. Whatman watermarked paper. Nineteenth century blue patterned paper boards (ca. 1838), covers decoratively bordered in gilt, spine worn and chipped, otherwise near fine. Front flyleaf with ink date "1838". A fine contemporary album with amusing plates. This is an intriguing little album of eighteen fine hand colored lithographed plates, each of which has been cut to the border thus losing it's title. We have been able to identify eleven of the images - nine are very similar to the illustrations in one of Henry Alken's rarest titles Sporting Notions (London, 1831-33) and the other two are very similar to the illustrations in his equally rare Ideas, Accidental and Incidental To Hunting and Other Sports (London, 1830).

Folio (14 1/2 x 10 3/4 inches; 369 x 273 mm.). 20 unnumbered pages including half-title, title-page, contents, dedication leaf, and advertisement leaf at end. Hand colored lithographed title and eleven superb hand-colored lithograph plates, all with their original tissue-guards. Publisher's green diaper-grain cloth, covers decoratively bordered and stamped in blind enclosing a large and quite magnificent gilt urn with flowers. Spine decoratively stamped and lettered in gilt, original yellow coated end-papers, all edges gilt. Lower 3 1/2 inches of front inner hinge slightly cracked - still the finest copy that we have ever seen.

"The covers are decorated with stamped and gilt bouquets of flowers in tall vases, typical of the age in which "Handsome and interesting ornaments for the drawing-room table" were in vogue." (Dunthorne).

James Andrews (1801-1876) was an English draughtsman, botanical painter and illustrator noted for his accomplished illustrations. He also taught flower-painting to young ladies. His first illustrated work was Flora's Gems (1830) for which Louisa Anne Twamley wrote the text. He created the illustrations for the famous nature writer Sarah Bowdich Lee's 1854 book Trees, Plants, and Flowers: Their Beauties, Uses, and Influences. In March 1857, his painting of fruit and a bowl in watercolour received a medal from the Royal Society of Agriculture and Botany in Ghent. In 1868, Andrews exhibited a piece called Earnest Andrews, a painting of fruit and flowers, at the Royal Academy of Art annual summer exhibition.





Woodcut illustration on verso of folio 8 with two movable 'volvelles', woodcut illustration on verso of folio 9 with original yellow 'lead line', woodcut illustration on verso of folio 11 with four movable volvelles and two original yellow 'lead lines', woodcut illustration on recto of folio 30 also with four movable volvelles, and woodcut illustration on recto of folio 57 with one movable volvelle and original 'lead line'. Forty-three astronomical woodcut illustrations in the text and many diagrams and historiated woodcut initials throughout. The title vignette, with legend "L'inferieure partie de la sphere" is the same as that in the first Paris edition of 1551, and the colophon is actually dated 1551. Contemporary mottled calf. Expertly rebacked with the original spine laid down, later endpapers. The world map "Charta Cosmographica..." is very fine and measures 13 x 9 1/16 inches; 334 x 230 mm. A wonderful example of this rare and important treatise complete with all of its moving parts.



One of 200 copies (out of a total of 240) printed on Batchelor paper with Hammer and Anvil water-mark. Octavo. Chapterheadings and shoulder-notes printed in red, and the initials of each chapter in red or blue. With fifty-three illustrations by Charles M. Gere, which were cut on wood by J.B. Swain. The initial letters designed by Graily Hewitt. Publisher's limp vellum, smooth spine lettered in gilt, fore and lower edges uncut, original green linen ties. A fine copy.

The Ashendene *I Fioretti*... contains fifty-three fine woodcuts illustrating the life of St. Francis of Assisi, and was the last Ashendene to be printed in Italian, and the last to contain Charles Gere's work.

William Graily Hewit or Graily Hewitt (1864–1952) was a British novelist and calligrapher, second only to Edward Johnston in importance to the revival of calligraphy in the country at the turn of the twentieth century. Hewitt sought to link calligraphy and type design, arguing that type should represent creations of pen. The Treyford Type, employed for The Pen and Type Design, was a design of Hewitt's. He also created a series of initials for St. John Hornby's Ashendene Press, during the long period 1902 to 1935.

Minimal rubbing to corners, still an an exceptionally fine example of a very rare edition.



Slight crease to lower right-hand corner of fifteenth color plate, two tiny rust marks just affecting lower corners of pp. 81-84, otherwise fine. Bound ca. 1940 by Bayntun (Rivière) Bath in full red crushed levant morocco. Front cover elaborately decorated and with an inlaid design in multi-colored morocco of the frontispiece. Spine with five raised bands, decoratively paneled and lettered in gilt in compartments. Front joint expertly and almost invisibly repaired. Housed in a felt-lined, half red morocco clamshell case, spine with five raised bands, decoratively tooled and lettered in gilt in compartments.



Bayntun of Bath. George Bayntun (1873-1940) served his apprenticeship with the Taylor family in Trim Street and started his own bookbinding business in Northumberland Place in 1894.



A spectacular example of an early 'Bayntun Rubaiyat'. Housed in a later? fleece-lined blue cloth slipcase.



Full teal crushed levant morocco, covers with triple-ruled borders surrounding an inlaid border of maroon morocco, in turn surrounding a highly elaborate gilt and inlaid morocco design featuring 'Cobden-Sanderson' style gilt leaves and inlaid red morocco flowers. Each cover with four circles of inlaid maroon morocco. Spine with five raised bands, decoratively tooled and inlaid in the same style, lettered in gilt in the second compartment. Gilt ruled board edges and highly elaborate gilt decorated wide turn-ins. Doublures of orange morocco with a very intricate and pleasing geometric design. Lilac, purple and cream decorated silk end-papers, all edges gilt. A truly amazing example. Early twentieth century designer bookbinding at its very best.


Henry Blackwell (1851-1928), bookbinder and bookseller, bibliographer and biographer, was the son of bookbinder Richard Blackwell of Liverpool whose bindery appeared in the Liverpool & Birkenhead Trades Directory in 1870. Henry emigrated to New York in 1877 where he supervised a large bindery. In 1892 he established his own shop in New York City. Blackwell played a prominent part in the Welsh-American life of his adopted country. He was a scholar of Welsh literature as well as binding, his 1899 essay, *Notes on Bookbinding*, was a memorable contribution. He had the largest Welsh Collection of books on this side of the Atlantic, and wrote articles, books and bibliographies about Welsh-American books. In 1893, he commissioned H.T. Sears to engrave a Welsh bookplate for his Welsh books. Herbert H. Johnson. *Notes on The Elston Press* #7; Will Ransom. *Private Presses and Their Books*, p. 260, #6.

With Fifty Fine Hand-Colored Engraved Plates Including Forty-Two of Birds

BROWN, Pierre (Peter). Nouvelles Illustrations de Zoologie... New Illustrations of Zoology... Together with a short and scientific description of the same. London: Printed for B. White, 1776. Title-pages and text in both French and English. First edition. Large quarto (11 5/16 x 9 inches; 288 x 229 mm.). Fifty finely hand-colored engraved plates depicting forty-two species of birds, five mammals, two insects and one amphibian. Contemporary full tree-calf, covers decoratively bordered in gilt, expertly re-backed to style. Spine with five raised bands, decoratively tooled in gilt in compartments, red morocco label lettered in gilt, gilt board edges and turn-ins, marbled end-papers. Corners expertly repaired. A near fine example with superb hand-coloring of the plates.

The work is principally based on specimens in the natural history collections of Marmaduke Tunstall and Thomas Pennant, but also includes plates based on drawings by the Ceylonese artist P.C. de Bevere in Java and Ceylon. Forty-two of the plates depict birds, five mammals, two insects and one an amphibian. Much of the text was supplied by Pennant, who had previously employed Brown for two of the plates in his British Zoology, and the work was published by Gilbert White's brother, Benjamin. Peter Brown, a Dane by birth, was also known as a flower painter, exhibiting at the Royal Academy from 1770 to 1791.

First Edition, First Isue of Little Lord Fauntleroy With a Signed Quotation from the Book

With twenty-six illustrations from drawings by Reginald B. Birch, many of them full-page. Publisher's green cloth, front cover and spine pictorially stamped in red, black and gilt, brown coated endpapers. Minimal rubbing to extremities, inner hinges sound. An excellent copy with an original quotation from the book. Chemised in a quarter dark blue morocco slipcase (chemise joints neatly strengthened).

Little Lord Fauntleroy is a sentimental novel by the English-American writer Frances Hodgson Burnett, her first children's novel. It was published as a serial in St. Nicholas Magazine from November 1885 to October 1886, then as a book by Scribner's (the publisher of St. Nicholas) in 1886. Frances Eliza Hodgson Burnett (1849-1924) was a British-born American novelist and playwright who was born in Cheetham, Manchester, England. She is best known for the three children's novels Little Lord Fauntleroy (1886), A Little Princess (1905), and The Secret Garden (1911).

Complete with the original printed buff paper front and back wrappers bound in. With the armorial bookplate of Sir David Salomons on front paste-down.


A wonderful example of 'one of the rarest of English colour plate books' (Tooley), and the scarcest by far of Bury's railway books.

Salvatore David (1859-1929) "was the son of Bernard David, a noted Second Empire binder-gilder who worked for [Leon] Gruel before establishing his own atelier in 1855. On his father's retirement in 1890, David took over the bindery and initially applied a similar, classically inspired range of ornaments to his covers. But by 1900, after applying himself to the production of commercial and library bindings without much success, he turned to éditions de luxe, which he decorated with a blend of gold fillets and garlanded flowers in a compelling and original manner. In 1907, he moved his shop from 12 rue Guénégaud to 49 rue le Peletier, where he remained until his death. Important collectors of his work included René Descamps-Scrive and Freund-Deschamps" (Duncan & De Bartha, Art Nouveau and Art Deco Bookbinding, French Masterpieces 1880-1940, pp. 189-190).





Unfolded to its full length of four feet, people, furniture, and even fixtures pop-out and each of the scenes is rich in detail. There is even a piano with a bust of Beethoven on the top. Due to its popularity it was issued over the years with a few changes to reflect the times; for instance the gypsy cart is replaced here by a motor car. It is rare to find any mechanical that has survived the little hands of children, in such wonderful condition. This is certainly one of the most elaborate and charming of the mechanicals issued by Lothar Meggendorfer. See Haining pp. 122-128.

"The artist, under the pseudonym Quillenbois, gives caricatures of the most popular Parisian dances of the period, [including the Polka and the Cancan]" (Hiler). Hiler, p. 777; Lipperheide, 3105.

Charles-Marie de Sarcus, a.k.a. Quillenbois, (1821-1867) was born in Dijon and died in Paris. He was a French painter and caricaturist during the middle of the nineteenth century, best known for his cartoons, which were published in many newspapers and albums between 1845 and 1853, and signed Quillenbois. This pseudonym was due to the crutches that the young, disabled artist used to move around. He was a friend of Cham, a.k.a. Charles Amédée de Noé (1818-1879) and he contributed to the satirical newspaper *La Revue Comique* (1848-1849), providing drawings to *Fashion*, *L Éclair* as well as *L'Illustration*, and was the official draftsman of the *Caricaturist* (1849-1851).

The wolf is dressed in a mop cap, wearing glasses and hiding behind the curtains of the bed. Grandmother's slippers are sitting neatly on the floor by the bed and next to the bed there is a candle and a bowl on a small table. Little Riding Hood is dressed in her riding hood holding some flowers she has picked for her Grandmother and carrying a large basket with the pot of butter sticking out of it. As always, Rackham has created a moment in time - one which is universally recognized.

The Blessed Damozel is perhaps the best known poem by Dante Gabriel Rossetti as well as the title of some of his best known paintings. The poem was first published in 1850 in the Pre-Raphaelite journal The Germ. Rossetti subsequently revised the poem twice and republished it in 1856, 1870 and 1873.

The poem was partially inspired by Edgar Allan Poe's poem *The Raven* with its depiction of a lover grieving on Earth over the death of his loved one. Rossetti chose to represent the situation in reverse. The poem describes the damozel observing her lover from heaven, and her unfulfilled yearning for their reunion in heaven.

Harry Rountree (1878-1950) was a prolific illustrator working in England around the turn of the twentieth century. He came to London in 1901 from New Zealand, when he was 23 years old. Determined to make his mark on the then-flourishing magazine and book market, he struggled, studied and sold the occasional drawing. However, when the editor of *Little Folks* magazine gave him a commission to illustrate a story with an animal, he found his feet and suddenly he became quite successful. By 1903 he was illustrating books for the editor of *Little Folks*, writing and illustrating his own books, and in demand by nearly every publisher in London.







OCLC locates just three copies of this very scarce suite of plates. It is possible that the missing numbers (37 through 48 inclusive) were deliberately withdrawn for some reason unknown to us. Providing some circumstantial backing for this theory is that Plate No. 49, the first of the final group, depicts a crowd greeting Louis Philippe with "Vive le Roi!" after the July Revolution in which he rose to power. Four of the early plates were lithographed by Villain. Almost all the plates, including one of the ones credited to Villain, are also marked by Gihaut, unless there are no names at all.


This important paper was written and read to the Society at the urging of its president Octave Chanute, a French-born civil engineer whose passion for aeronautics made him "an international clearing house for information on aviation" (The Wright Brothers: Heirs of Prometheus, Smithsonian Institution 1978, p. 15), and whose own carefully tabulated gliding experiments in 1896 and 1897 paved the way for the Wrights' later successes. Octave Chanute (February 18, 1832, Paris – November 23, 1910, Chicago, Illinois) was an American civil engineer and aviation pioneer, born in France. He provided many budding enthusiasts, including the Wright brothers, with help and advice, and helped to publicize their flying experiments. Cranford, which originally appeared as a serial in Charles Dickens' magazine, Household Words, 1851-53, and saw its first publication in book form in 1853, is "a series of linked sketches of life among the ladies of a quiet country village in the 1830s... The greatest charm of Cranford is its amused but loving portrait of the old-fashioned customs and 'elegant economy' of a delicately observed group of middle-aged figures in a landscape" (Oxford Companion to English Literature).

A Fine and Early Exhibition Binding by Zaehnsdorf

Edward FitzGerald's version of Omar Khayyam's quatrains was widely read only after it was taken up by the Pre-Raphaelites in 1861. The first version of the Rubáiyat had been published in 1859, the same year that Darwin's Origin of the Species had appeared.
